THE MEANING of HOLY WEEK and EASTER in the CHRISTIAN FAITH

Dear All,

I wonder what children would most associate with Easter celebrations. What do we most think of? I suspect many think of bunnies, eggs, chicks and so forth. It's not easy to find Easter cards that still have on them the cross, which for Christians lies at the heart of Easter and of the whole of life. It's a bit like adverts where you remember the ad but not the product — always the nightmare of advertisers.

So I've checked out some of our Easter traditions in the hope that through them we can remember the profound meaning of Holy Week and Easter in the Christian faith. And give thanks to God for his great love for us and the lengths to which he was prepared to go.

Hot cross buns apparently date back to the 12th century. Very tasty they are too but we perhaps forget their meaning now the shops stock them all year round.

Originally they would be eaten only on Good Friday at the end of Lent – the cross on top reminding us of Jesus' death on the cross for love of us. The buns are full of spices to remind us of the spices used to embalm Jesus' body at his burial.

Eggs (and chicks): I can remember as a child, on Easter Day, my father would boil eggs with gorse flowers in the water so the shells went bright yellow; we then decorated them.

Eggs have long been used as a symbol of Jesus' resurrection: the shell reminding us of the sealed tomb and then the cracking of the shell as Jesus' breaking out into new life. The promise of resurrection is that we can make a new start, forgiven where we've messed up, and that life and goodness will have the last word.

Nowadays eggs are largely chocolate but the symbolism is still there.

The Easter bunny is something I'm less sure of so had to research, as I don't remember the bunny featuring so much in the past. I read 'it is not entirely clear how the rabbit is a symbol of Easter'. However it appears that in Germany, the rabbit was pictured bringing Easter eggs to children; in the 18th century, this custom went over to America and has since come to us.

I guess rabbits speak of new life and energy – very much what the resurrection of Jesus is all about.

And finally the **Simnel Cake:** a delicious eat; fruit cake with a layer of marzipan in the middle and on top. Marzipan balls then decorate the top to represent Jesus' disciples, but there are only 11 balls as Judas is excluded, having betrayed Jesus to the authorities.

Do enter into the wonderful story of Easter as we follow these traditions, the story that lies behind them all. For it is the greatest love story ever: that Jesus came to earth to show us how much we are loved, to wipe the slate clean where we have got it all so wrong; and to give us a new start. So that we are better able to love Him, ourselves and the world.

REFLECTION

Between 1941 and 1945, the Nazis attempted to annihilate all of Europe's Jews. This systematic and planned attempt to murder European Jewry is known as the Holocaust (The Shoah in Hebrew). From the time they assumed power in 1933, the Nazis used propaganda, persecution, and legislation to deny human and civil rights to Jews. They used centuries of antisemitism as their foundation. By the end of the Holocaust, six million Jewish men, women and children had perished in ghettos, mass-shootings, in concentration camps and extermination camps.

MEMORIAL As I sat on the 27th January watching some of the programs broadcast as part of holocaust **DAY TRUST** memorial day, I wondered how far the world has really come in terms of its tolerance to "minority" groups, in particular minority religious groups, since that time.

I am sure that you will agree that the holocaust was a terrible thing, spreading from the obsession of one man to becoming the policy of a nation, resulting in the killing of 6 million Jews and other minority groups in Europe.

But how far have we really come since then?



The situation has undoubtedly improved in Europe but across the world it is reported that 75% of the world's population live in countries where religious freedom violations are commonplace. The areas most affected by these are Asia, Africa and Latin America where national religions are intolerant of other minority religions, leading to oppression and violence against those groups, or states that seek to suppress religions and their practices. In some countries it is even one

denomination of a religion against another denomination.

So how far have we come? Well the wide scale rounding up and killing of vast numbers of people has gone but constant suppression, oppression, harassment and imprisonment of religious minority groups and their members is certainly still with us. And all of that is not taking into account the actions of groups such as IS. So maybe, in this world that we perceive to be full of freedoms, we haven't come that far in our tolerance to those who are different to the accepted norms.
